CACTI OF THE MONTH APRIL 2009 ECHINOCACTUS, FEROCACTUS and THELOCACTUS *By Dennis Kucera*

These three genera are very closely related and Dr. Edmund Jaeger used only the genus Echinocactus in his Desert Wildflower book. Over 50 years ago botanists split the genus into Ferocactus and Echinocactus. Of the three tribes of the cactus family these two genera belong to the cereus tribe, Cereeae, known by its ribbed fleshy stems of continuous growth. There are

eight sub tribes in the cereus tribe. These three genera belong to the Echinocactaneae sub tribe, the barrel, ball and star cacti. About 25 genera are included in this sub tribe including Ariocarpus, Astrophytum, Chilenia, Frailea, Gymnocalycium, Lophophora, Notocactus, Parodia, and others. Ferocactus are commonly named barrel cactus, fish hook cactus, or visnaga. There are about 25 species of these large ribbed ovoid cactus of the southwestern U. S. and Mexico. their stems are cespitose, mostly simple globose to cylindrical, strongly ribbed and spiny. The larger spines are often flattened and hooked. The flowers are solitary on the upper side of the areoles, campanulate to funnel form, yellow to red, and staying open for several days. The tube and ovary are densely scaly, stamens numerous, fruit oblong and fleshy, seeds are black and pitted.

Ferocactus cylindraceus previously acanthodes is the common barrel cactus of our deserts in California with a range extending into Utah, Nevada, Arizona and Baja California. This plant can live 30 years or more forming a cylindrical stem one foot thick and seven feet tall. It has a crown of yellow flowers in spring.

F. Gatesii, named for Howard E. Gates, is a cylindrical cactus up to five feet tall. The flowers are red, funnel form 2 1/2 long and wide. It is native only to Smith Island of Baja California.

F. viridescens is a small coastal barrel of San Diego County coast into northern Baja California.

F. wislizenii, the fish hook cactus, grows to ten feet high with orange red flowers 2 1/2 inches long and wide. It grows wild in Arizona to Texas and northern Mexico.

Other Ferocactus worth getting are F. chrysacantha, F. diguetii from Baja CA, F. emoryi, F. fordii, F. glaucescens, F. gracilis the red barrel cactus from Baja CA, F. hamatacanthus with long hooked spines from Texas and Mexico, F. hystrix, F. latispinus, F. madrodiscus, F. rectispinus, F. recurvus, F. robustus, F. stainesii and F. stainesii var. pilosus

Echinocactus has 16 species found wild in Mexico and the southwestern U. S. It has similar growth characteristics as Ferocactus, except the crown is woolly and the fruits are woolly.

E. grusonii, the golden barrel is a common favorite easily grown from seed. It has a large simple stem up to three feet wide and tall with bright golden spines. The older larger plants may grow several globular offshoots at its base. This species originally from central Mexico may be extinct in the wild from over collecting. It now survives in cultivation and is fortunately commonly grown.

E. ingens the Mexican giant barrel is globose to four feet wide and high. The cultivar cv., *helephoras* is heavily banded with purple when young.

E. polycephalus with red spines forms clusters of globose stems up to 30 in a cluster. Each stem is one foot thick and up to two feet high. This species is native to south eastern California Nevada, Utah, western Arizona and northern Mexico.

THELOCACTUS is a genus of 11 species of smaller spherical cacti, native to the south western part of the United States and northern Mexico. They are closely related to Ferocactus and some were originally species of Ferocactus. Thelocactus are 6 to 8 inches wide and tall with relatively large showy flowers up to 3 inches across, yellow pink or magenta.

SUCCLENTS OF THE MONTH APRIL 2009

GASTERIA, HAWORTHIA, AND HYBRIDS

The Genus Gasteria of the **Aloaceae** number about 20 species of perennial, succulent herbs native to South Africa. The different species common names of cow-tongue cactus, lawyer's

tongue, dutch-wings and ox tongue. These plants are mostly stemless and form clumps. Their leaves are fleshy, flat or somewhat keeled and spotted or tubercled. Their leaves are 2 ranked or in spiral rosettes. Their flowers are pink red or rose, often with green tips in loose racemes of panicles. Their perianth, petals, are tubular. Each flower has six stamens developing into a 3 valved capsule, containing flattened and winged seed.

G. bicolor v. liliputana has leaves in spirals, lance shaped about 2 1/2 inches long. They are dark shiny green with white spots.

G. carnuta v. verucosa is the warty Gasteria. The leaves are 2 ranked, lanceolate 4 to 9 inches long and 1 1/2 inches wide and dull green. They are covered with raised white spots. The flowers are 1 inch long in racemes 2 feet tall.

Other choice species of **Gasteria** are;

G. acinifolia, with leaves up to 24 inches long, **G. armstrongii**, **G. batesiana**, and **G. glomerata** with showy spikes of orange flowers.

The Genus Haworthia of the **Aloaceae**, number about, 60 species of succulent perennial herbs native to South Africa. These small plants are stemless or short stemmed often suckering thus forming clumps Their leaves are imbricate in many rows forming dense rosettes. The leaf surfaces are often tuberculate like white warts, and usually keeled underneath. Their small flowers are white with green or rosy stripes in racemes or panicles. The short flower perianth is tubular and 2 lipped. Each flower has 6 stamens and the fruit is a 3 valved capsule.

H. limifolia is known as the fairy-washboard. Their leaves are triangular, about 2 inches long and are dark green with horizontal ribs on both sides.

H. papilosa is known as pearly-dots, and forms vertically elongated rosettes 8 to 10 inches high. The leaves are lanceolate to 4 inches long surfaced with white tubercles.

H. pygmaea has oblong ovate leaves only 1 ½ inches long. They are dark green and granulate. Gasterias, Haworthias and Aloes are closely related and can be hybridized.

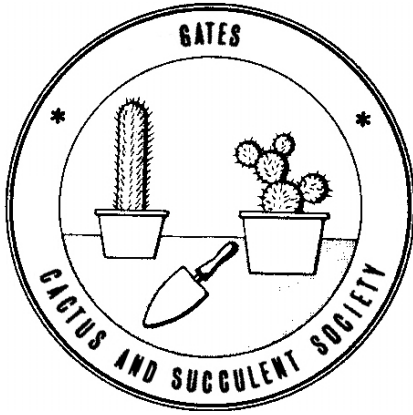

We will continue to have a Junior division, defined as anyone 13 years old and under. A trophy will be awarded.
